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REPRODUCTIVE RIGHTS VS REPRODUCTIVE JUSTICE

REPRODUCTIVE RIGHTS	REPRODUCTIVE JUSTICE
Prioritizes a woman's legal right to reproductive health care.	Address the issues and barriers that women face in reproductive care.
Emphasizes legal / constitutional rights.	Acknowledges social inequalities.
Primarily based in the electoral system.	Grassroots movement led by women of color.
Focuses on choice.	Focuses on access.



Reproductive Justice & Dignity

In Islam, dignity is a fundamental right for all humans, as it lays the foundation for the wellbeing of humanity. To maintain this right, Islamic law calls on the protection of maqasid al-shari'ah preservation of life, faith, intellect, property, and lineage.

Human rights derived from the maqasid al-shari'ah

The right to adequate and life saving healthcare, knowledge about sexual health, freedom from poverty, and freedom from hardship.

"We have bestowed dignity on the progeny of Adam [...] and conferred on them special favours, above a great part of Our creation." (Qur'an 17:70)

Why is reproductive justice an important concept in Islam?

Although misunderstood by many, Islam takes a generally positive stance on sex and sexual relations between partners. This positive stance, as interpreted in the text, also includes the rights of individuals to proceed through life with reproductive choice, dignity, and safety, including a safe pregnancy, a safe sex life, and a safe environment to raise children. These rights, as decreed by Islamic jurisprudence, are not possible without the concepts associated with reproductive justice.

To preserve life

To preserve intellect

To preserve faith

To preserve property

To preserve lineage

Reproductive Rights Concepts (1994 International Conference on Population & Development)

> the right to attain the highest standard of sexual and reproductive health.

the right to freely decide the number and spacing of children, and the right to have the information and means to do so.

the right to have satisfying and safe sexual relations.

the right to make decisions concerning reproduction free of coercion, discrimination, or violence.



Reproductive Justice in Islamic Jurisprudence

ADEQUATE PARENTAL SUPPORT

"No soul should be compelled beyond capacity, neither the mother made to suffer for the child nor the father for his offspring..." (2:233)

BIRTH SPACING

The mothers shall [breastfeed] their offspring for two whole years, if [the parents] desire to complete the term. (2:233)

CONTRACEPTION

Jabir (Allah be pleased with him) reported: "We [the Companions of the Prophet (PBUH)] used to practise 'azl during the lifetime of Allah's Messenger (PBUH). This (the news of this practice) reached [the Prophet] and he did not forbid us".
